Guidelines for Mock Lecture

As part of the interview process, all candidates applying for teaching posts must undergo a mock lecture before being interviewed, and may be asked to demonstrate ability via portfolio. Candidates are required to give a 15-20 minute mock lecture, regarding the interview panel as students.

The candidate is free to use whatever medium and teaching aids are appropriate and is encouraged to use new technology, including the demonstration of software programmes, PC, laptop and projector. Art or fashion design related equipment maybe used for demonstration e.g. sketchpad, garment stand, portfolio and sewing machine.

The lecture should cover an item (or items) of the candidate's choice from an existing (or proposed) course offered by the Faculty or Department.

The lecture should not be the first lecture in a course, nor should it be an overview of a course.

The lecture will focus on explaining a particular aspect of the course to students who are unfamiliar with the topic.

The lecturer should begin by outlining any previous information that the students are expected to know (e.g. "I'm assuming you know how to which we covered last week").

Questions will be asked of the lecturer, either during or after the lecture.
